

Ways Fire Agencies can participate in the Great California ShakeOut Drill:

- Register your participation at <u>www.shakeout.org/california/register</u> and conduct a Drop, Cover, and Hold On drill on 10/17 with all fire personnel.
- Evacuate all facilities and review station earthquake procedures.
- Review internal training on fire following earthquake protocols.
- Exercise search and rescue operations.
- Conduct a communications drill for all fire personnel to include amateur radio.
- Participate in or coordinate a CERT Drill with a fire following earthquake focus.
- Partner with local school, businesses or organization to demonstrate fire extinguisher use and provide opportunities for the public to practice fire safety on 10/17.

Ways Fire Agencies can promote ShakeOut:

- Lead by example through being listed as a participating organization when you register to participate at <u>www.shakeout.org/california</u>.
- Print and display posters, distribute flyers, and put web banner images on your website, all available at <u>www.shakeout.org/california/resources</u>
- Messaging templates, sample social media posts, and other resources are also at www.shakeout.org/california/messaging.
- Encourage your Fire Board/City Council to designate October as Great ShakeOut Month
- Distribute a press release about your participation in the Great California ShakeOut.
- Join <u>www.nextdoor.com</u> and get the word out about the Great California ShakeOut to your neighborhoods.
- Partner with a local school, business or organization to promote earthquake and fire safety prior to ShakeOut day.

Fire safety messages Fire Agencies and others can share:

- Get a fire extinguisher and make sure everyone in your home who <u>can</u> use it, <u>knows how</u> to use it.
- After earthquakes, turn off your power at the circuit breaker and unplug your electronics.
- After earthquakes, check vents to make sure nothing separated before using your water heater or furnace.
- After earthquakes, use flashlights for light. DO NOT use candles, lighters or open flames. Until you know there is no gas leak, do not use electrical appliances, light switches or other devices as they can cause a spark.
- After earthquakes, turn off your gas service at the meter ONLY if you smell gas, hear the sound of gas escaping, or see other signs of a leak. Only the gas company should turn it back on.
