Shake, Rattle and Roll: Hundreds to "drop, cover and hold" as part of The Great California ShakeOut drill at The Tech Museum Insurance Commissioner Steve Poizner, emergency teams and "Q" the San Jose Earthquakes mascot to appear

SAN JOSE, SILICON VALLEY, Calif.-- More than 400 Bay Area students will "drop, cover and hold on" at The Tech Museum during the statewide Great California ShakeOut, the largest earthquake drill in the United States. The event, in which more than 7 million people are expected to participate, encourages Californians to prepare for the next big tremor and emphasizes that practice provides confidence during a time of peril.

The Tech Museum, as one of Northern California's "EPIcenters" (Education and Public Information Centers), will provide a number of hands-on learning activities for students and other visitors including California Insurance Commissioner Steve Poizner, Dr. Peter Friess, president of The Tech Museum, Humane Society Silicon Valley, United States Geological Survey, California Department of Conservation, Q, the San Jose Earthquakes' mascot and the team's "Shakers Squad," and San Jose police and fire.

WHAT: More than 400 students will participate in a statewide earthquake drill at The Tech Museum. Throughout the museum there will be stations teaching visitors how to create an earthquake kit, and how to ensure the safety of pets during an earthquake. Participants will also have the opportunity to step inside the Quake Cottage Mobile Earthquake Simulator, which simulates the strength of an 8.0 earthquake.

WHEN: At exactly 10:21 a.m. on Oct. 21, 2010, more than 7 million Californians will "drop, cover and hold on" in the country's largest earthquake drill. (Editors: please plan to arrive early)
